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... per cent (%) of Norway is covered by forests, and another % by “other wooded land”. The other 61% is termed “.....”. Forestry is an important business in Norway, and the consumption per inhabitant (caput) of forestry products is high. For example, the consumption per caput of sawnwood is cubic meters (m³), compared with m³ in the rest of Europe. “Forest and other wooded land” (FOWL) cover hectares (a hectare [ha] is 10,000 m²), of which ha are forested. Publicly-owned FOWL makes up% of the total, with ... % of FOWL being privately owned. The FOWL in ha/cap is The total growing stock of forest in Norway is m³, of which m³ is coniferous wood, and 168,000,000 m³ is wood.
